MAYOR'S MESSAGE:

During the past few weeks, the City has hosted many events that have delighted people of all ages. For example, at Dealy Field youngsters have been improving their athletic skills and enhancing their sense of teamwork, thanks to a wide variety of sports camps and clinics; and children have enjoyed our annual Summer Playground Camp and Marine Science Camp – along with many other fun activities. And, on August 13, as a way to honor that commitment to excellence, the Sea Isle City Beach Patrol Alumni Association hosted their annual Hall of Fame Induction Dinner at the Lobster Loft Restaurant, where former lifeguards Tim Barton, Eugene Riley and Pat Moran were honored. Then, on August 6, the SICBP hosted the 46th Annual Captain Bill Gallagher 10-Mile Island Run, which had nearly 1100 participants. –What a month it's been!

Looking ahead, I hope you can join us during the August 23 City Council meeting for a very special presentation by Bill Crean, the Treasurer of the Corporal Michael Crescenz Medal of Honor Statue Committee. On that day, Mr. Crean will present Sea Isle City with a "modello" replica of a statue of Corporal Crescenz that was recently unveiled at the Philadelphia Vietnam Veterans Memorial at Penn's Landing. Corporal Crescenz, a Philadelphia native and summer resident of Sea Isle City's 46th Street, received the Medal of Honor posthumously after heroically eliminating three enemy machine gun bunkers during a fierce battle in 1968. A 1966 graduate of Cardinal Dougherty High School, Corporal Crescenz was the only Philadelphian to receive the Medal of Honor during the Vietnam War – and we are very happy to help keep his memory alive here in Sea Isle City. So, please try to join us on August 23 if you can.

CITY COUNCIL'S MESSAGE:

During the August 9 City Council meeting, Council asked the Administration to review the City's proposed Promenade Lighting Program to ensure that the gazebo and pergolas at JFK Boulevard are included in that project. Council feels additional lighting in these areas will assist the Police Department as they maintain a family-friendly environment on the Promenade at night.

Council also asked the Administration to include funding for storm-water pumping stations in the upcoming draft Capital Plan to address flooding.

All of the Resolutions on the August 9 Consent Agenda were approved, including.

- Resolution 158, which authorized the Mayor to execute a labor contract between the City and the Middle Management Professional Employees Association for the term of January 1, 2015 through December 31, 2018.
- Resolution 160, which authorized the award of a contract for the purchase of a utility pick-up truck for the Sea Isle City Volunteer Fire Department.
- Resolution 165, which authorized support for an awareness initiative for Fibrodysplasia Ossificans Progressiva, a rare connective tissue disease that is characterized by abnormal bone development.

During the "Pending Business" portion of the August 9 meeting, Council asked the Administration to consider changing the City's current Beach Curfew from 10:00 p.m. to 9:00 p.m. in order to reduce unwanted loitering at night along the Promenade, particularly in the center of town.

During the "Citizen Comment" portion of the August 9 meeting, Council was asked to review the City's policies regarding the demolition and construction of buildings during the summer months. Council was also asked to examine the removal of asbestos from buildings during the summer. Additionally, it was suggested that youth dances would provide activities for teenagers at night; and some comments were made about the need for enforcement regarding businesses that impede public right of way by placing a-frame sign boards and flower pots on sidewalks - especially in areas where outside dining takes place.

MASTER PLAN RE-EXAMINATION UPDATE:

The Planning Board sub-committee received and reviewed the initial draft of the Master Plan Re-examination Report, which was prepared by Maser Consulting. That draft was forwarded to the full Planning Board.

The full Planning Board completed a review of the draft during their August 8 meeting. Based on that review, the draft Master Plan Re-examination report is expected to be presented during a Public Hearing on Monday, September 12, at 7:00 p.m., in City Hall. The public is encouraged to attend the September 12 meeting and participate in the discussion regarding Sea Isle City's Master Plan Re-Examination. The draft Master Plan Re-examination report will be available for review by the end of August, prior to the public hearing. It will be available for review at City Hall, as well as on the City's website.

PROJECT UPDATES:

In accordance with our typical practice, now that the summer season is here, we try to limit the amount of construction taking place on public property in order to minimize the disruption to our residents and visitors, as for many, this time of the year is precious. We also are in the process of preparing and putting into place plans for the next round of capital improvements throughout the City. As these projects move forward through the design, bidding, and construction phases, we will continue to provide you with updates on their progress.

Utility Reconstruction, 36th & 37th Streets (Fall 2015 construction)

On March 26, 2015, City Council awarded a bid to Garden State General Construction in the amount of \$431,353.40 for the utility reconstruction of 36th Street & 37th Street, from Cini Street to Landis Avenue. As of this date, all work has been completed. Due to the inclement weather over the winter, the area did not have sufficient time to settle, therefore, the City will reconstruct the streets in early fall of 2016.

Utility Reconstruction, various streets

On October 27, 2015, City Council awarded a bid to RTW Construction, of Southampton, New Jersey, in the amount of \$744,713 for utility reconstruction at the following locations:

- 47th Street from Landis Avenue to Promenade – substantially completed.
- 49th Street from Landis Avenue to Promenade – substantially completed.
- 65th Street from Landis Avenue to Central Avenue – held until fall.
- 65th Street from Landis Avenue to Pleasure Avenue – substantially completed.
- 69th Street from Landis Avenue to Central Avenue – substantially completed.
- 76th Street from Landis Avenue to Pleasure Avenue – substantially completed.

Work to install new sanitary main, sanitary laterals, new water main and water services on 47th, 49th, and 65th Street, from Landis to Pleasure, and 69th Street is completed. All uncompleted work will resume in the fall including paving.

Roadway reconstruction program – various streets

On March 15, 2016, City Council awarded a bid to Ricky Slade Construction, Inc., of Bridgeton, New Jersey, in the amount of \$299,437.50 for road reconstruction at the following locations...(This project is being closed out).

- 44th Street from Landis Avenue to the Promenade – completed
- 46th Street from Landis Avenue to the Promenade – completed
- 56th Street from Landis Avenue to the Promenade – completed
- Roadway elevation on selected areas of 44th Street and Venicean Road – completed

Sea Isle Boulevard

The Cape May County Board of Chosen Freeholders, at their May 13, 2014 meeting, awarded a \$12.7 million contract to South State, Inc. for the Sea Isle Boulevard Improvement project that will raise the roadway by approximately 4.5-feet and otherwise reconstruct Sea Isle Boulevard.

Traffic has been diverted to the south side of the boulevard; and the contractor has placed fill on the north-side of the causeway to an average height of about 6.5-feet, which is 2-feet higher than the eventual height of the completed roadway. The additional 2-feet, which will be removed prior to the next construction phase, is surcharge to compress the underlying layers of soil. The goal is to obtain as much settlement as possible prior to paving on top of the new fill. The current plan is to start paving of the north side this coming fall.

The entrance to the northbound parkway has been reconfigured in order to provide room for eastbound vehicles to travel around vehicles making a left turn onto the parkway entrance. Motorists are advised to be aware of the revised traffic patterns in the construction zone and the reduced speed limit.

Streetscape Improvement on Landis Avenue

On September 8, 2015, City Council awarded a bid to Think Pavers Hardscaping of Swedesboro, NJ in the amount of \$796,648.33 for streetscape improvements on Landis Avenue from 43rd Street to 39th Street. This project includes various aspects of beautification which includes new sidewalks, paver crosswalks, traffic striping, lighting, sod, stone mulching, various tree plantings & tree grates, benches and bike racks. The block from JFK Boulevard to 40th Street was previously completed as part of the JFK Gateway Project. Punch list items are being completed and Landis Avenue is now open to all vehicular traffic.

Public Works Maintenance Garage – 80th Street & Central

On March 23, 2016, City Council awarded a bid to Archetto Construction, of Vineland, NJ, to replace the roof, siding and insulation at this location. Work has begun on this project. Both the east and west side and the roof have been completed. The north side of the building has also been complete with work continuing on the south side. The electric has been fully restored to the building. The maintenance department continues to work out of this location.

Sea Isle Branch – Cape May County Library

The Department of Public Works, in conjunction with the County Library System, Environmental Commission and the Shade Tree Committee, has been working hard to enhance the landscaping at the 4800 Park Road site. This included parking lot and walkway improvements, grading, irrigation, sod, landscaping and trees. Also included were two Terrapin Turtle gardens for nesting purposes. Signage is on order to explain their nesting habits including “fun facts.” This portion was in cooperation with Cameron Day, of Sea Isle Boy Scout Troop 76, for his Eagle Project. Public Works employees and Cameron cooperated with the Historical Museum to redo the memorial garden, which now includes a new water feature, enhancements to the landscaping and restoration of the mast and statue.

DON'T DRIVE THROUGH WATER:

The Sea Isle City Police Department reminds motorists of the dangers and hazards associated with driving through flooded streets. City Officials have received numerous complaints regarding vehicles driving through flood water at a high rate of speed, which causes severe wakes that can injure nearby pedestrians, damage fencing and other property, and push water into homes and businesses. Also, drivers often become stranded because vehicles are simply not designed to drive through water. Each year, countless vehicles are damaged or completely destroyed because drivers do not realize that water is often deeper than it appears. Also, drivers mistakenly believe they "can make it through" if they simply drive fast enough. If stranded, emergency personnel may not be able to assist you at peak tides. Accordingly, please be mindful of the adverse effects of driving a vehicle through flood water and refrain from doing so.

TRASH & RECYCLING INFO:

Curbside trash and recycling collections take place twice each week on the following streets:

1st to 44th Street = Wednesday & Saturday

45th to 70th Street = Monday & Thursday

71st to 94th Street = Tuesday & Friday

Don't Forget: The City will not collect carpeting or other construction materials, propane tanks, tires or batteries. Sea Isle City is a Single Stream Recycling Community, which means residents can combine all of their recyclable materials (paper, cans, glass and plastics) in one curbside collection bin. Recycling is not just a good idea...it's the law in Sea Isle City.

Sea Isle City's Trash and Recycling Depot, located next to the Bridge on JFK Boulevard, is open seven days a week (7:15 a.m. - 2:45 p.m.). The Depot will be closed on holidays (except New Year's Day, Presidents Day, Memorial Day, Independence Day and Labor Day). The Depot will accept drop-offs of trash and recycling, however Bulk Trash is not accepted at that location. **Free Refrigerator Magnets** with a complete list of Sea Isle City's year-round trash and recycling information are now available at the Public Works Building, 3905 Central Avenue, and at the Welcome Center, 300 JFK Boulevard. BIKING OR WALKING? HERE'S IMPORTANT INFO YOU SHOULD KNOW:

Attention Pedestrians:

- By law, pedestrians must cross streets at corners and intersections. Failure to obey pedestrian signals and use crosswalks at signaled intersections comes with a \$54 fine.
- Be on the lookout for vehicles turning right on red – always look left, right, and left again before crossing any street.
- Be visible when walking at night and in inclement weather.
- Only walk sober.
- Eliminate all distractions while walking, such as texting and talking on the phone.

Attention Bicyclists:

- Bicyclists must follow the rules of the road (stop at stop signs, yield to pedestrians in crosswalks, etc.).
- New Jersey law requires anyone under age 17 who rides a bicycle, is a passenger on a bicycle, or is towed as a passenger by a bicycle to wear a safety helmet (N.J.S.A. 39-4-10.1).
- Children should only ride bikes that fit their size – not bikes they will “grow into.”
- No one should ride a bike at night without bicycle lights, N.J.S.A. 39-4-10 (a white light on the front and a red light on the rear of your bike) – and always wear brightly-colored clothing at night (reflective clothes and reflective strips are ideal).
- A bell or other warning device is a legal requirement in New Jersey. It will probably not be heard by motor vehicle drivers, but it is useful as a warning and as a courtesy to alert other bicyclists and pedestrians of your approach (N.J.S.A. 39:4-11).
- Everyone should keep their bikes tuned-up and functioning properly.
