**SEA ISLE CITY'S ANNUAL MEMORIAL DAY CEREMONY ON MAY 30
WILL HONOR THOSE WHO MADE THE ULTIMATE SACRIFICE FOR
AMERICA'S FREEDOM**

SEA ISLE CITY, NJ – The public is invited to honor the men and women who died while serving in our nation's armed forces during Sea Isle City's annual Memorial Day Ceremony at 10:00 a.m. on Monday, May 30. The ceremony, which will be led by Mayor Leonard Desiderio at Veterans Park, JFK Boulevard and Landis Avenue, will feature numerous participants, including veterans from VFW Post 1963, local religious leaders, officials from Cape May County, members of the Cape May County Militia, and a large gathering of patriotic residents and visitors.

During the ceremony, wreaths will be placed at the base of the park's Memorial Fountain, a Roll Call of Sea Isle's Honored Dead will be read aloud, patriotic hymns will be sung, and Taps will solemnly be played.

Immediately after the ceremony, Boy Scout Troop 76 will lead a procession to the JFK Boulevard Beach, where members of the Sea Isle City Beach Patrol will row a lifeguard boat beyond the breakers and set flowers adrift in honor of America's Naval Dead.
