MAYOR'S MESSAGE:

Tuesday, August 2, was an eventful day. That morning, I had the pleasure of joining other City officials at the Welcome Center to congratulate Matthew Baldini, of Boy Scout Troop 76, who just completed his Eagle Scout Project. In an effort to help people with disabilities, Matt decided to create a pamphlet that spotlights businesses and public facilities with ADA ramps, elevators and other amenities for those who need physical assistance. We are very proud of Matt and all of our local scouts for the good work they perform in our community. Additionally, I commend the Baldini family for their rich history in scouting – including Matt's older brother Paul, Jr., and his Dad, Paul Sr., who are both Eagle Scouts themselves. Since only 4% of all Boy Scouts become Eagle Scouts – and Sea Isle City has numerous men who have achieved that distinction – our community has many reasons to be proud.

Also on Tuesday, I had a very productive meeting with County Engineer Dale Foster to discuss the Sea Isle Boulevard causeway and several other County-related topics that affect our town. Currently, we expect Phase 2 of the causeway construction project to begin this autumn, and we will give you further updates on Phase 2 as the project's launch date approaches. No doubt, everyone is looking forward to seeing this important construction effort come to fruition. In the meantime, please know that we appreciate your patience as this project continues – and don't forget that the causeway's speed limit of 40 mph is designed to keep everyone safe as they travel along Sea Isle Boulevard.

On Tuesday night, the Sea Isle City Police Department hosted their annual National Night Out celebration at Excursion Park, which was very well attended. It was great to see so many families enjoying an evening of terrific entertainment – and showing their support for our Police officers, who are there 24-hours a day to serve and protect us. My congratulations go to Chief Tom D'Intino, Captain Tom McQuillen, Captain Tony Garreffo and all of our men and women in blue for a job well done on Tuesday night – and each night of the year.

Looking ahead, this Saturday is the Sea Isle City Beach Patrol's annual Captain Bill Gallagher 10-Mile Island Run. CITY COUNCIL'S MESSAGE:

City Council would like to acknowledge the work of Boy Scout Matt Baldini, who recently completed his Eagle Scout Project. Matt designed a new brochure that lists ADA-accessible facilities and businesses in Sea Isle City, and it was unveiled on Tuesday morning at the Welcome Center. City Council recently held a closed session meeting to discuss a City employee labor contract, which we expect will soon be finalized. It is anticipated that during an August Council meeting, that contract will be ratified and put into effect.

During the July 26 City Council meeting, all resolutions on the Consent Agenda were approved, including...

- Resolution 152, which supports the City's participation in the Sustainable Jersey Municipal Certification Program. Sustainable Jersey assists Garden State towns that want to go green, save money and take steps to sustain their quality of life.
- Resolution 155, which authorizes the City's participation in a National Cooperative Purchasing Program for the acquisition of a Spartan 4x4 Pumper Fire Engine at a cost of \$535,845.

The next City Council meeting will take place on Tuesday, August 9, at 10:00 a.m. in Council Chambers. We hope to see you there!

PROJECT UPDATES:

In accordance with our typical practice, now that the summer season is here, we try to limit the amount of construction taking place on public property, in order to minimize the disruption to our residents and visitors, as for many, this time of the year is precious. We also are in the process of preparing and putting into place plans for the next round of capital improvements throughout the City. As these projects move forward through the design, bidding, and construction phases, we will continue to provide you with updates on their progress.

Utility Reconstruction, 36th & 37th Streets (fall 2015 construction)

On March 26, 2015, City Council awarded a bid to Garden State General Construction in the amount of \$431,353.40 for the utility reconstruction of 36th Street & 37th Street from Cini Street to Landis Avenue. As of this date, all work has been completed. Due to the inclement weather over the winter, the area did not have sufficient time to settle, therefore, the City will reconstruct the streets in early fall of 2016.

Utility Reconstruction, various streets

On October 27, 2015, City Council awarded a bid to RTW Construction of Southampton, New Jersey in the amount of \$744,713 for utility reconstruction at the following locations:

- 47th Street from Landis Avenue to Promenade – substantially completed.
- 49th Street from Landis Avenue to Promenade – substantially completed.
- 65th Street from Landis Avenue to Central Avenue – held until fall.
- 65th Street from Landis Avenue to Pleasure Avenue – substantially completed.
- 69th Street from Landis Avenue to Central Avenue – substantially completed.
- 76th Street from Landis Avenue to Pleasure Avenue – substantially completed.

Work to install new sanitary main, sanitary laterals, new water main and water services on 47th, 49th, and 65th from Landis to Pleasure and 69th Street is completed. All uncompleted work will resume in the fall including paving.

Roadway reconstruction program – various streets

On March 15, 2016, City Council awarded a bid to Ricky Slade Construction, Inc., of Bridgeton, New Jersey, in the amount of \$299,437.50 for road reconstruction at the following locations. This project is being closed out.

- 44th Street from Landis Avenue to the Promenade – completed
- 46th Street from Landis Avenue to the Promenade – completed
- 56th Street from Landis Avenue to the Promenade – completed
- Roadway elevation on selected areas of 44th Street and Venician Road – completed

Sea Isle Boulevard

The Cape May County Board of Chosen Freeholders, at their May 13, 2014 meeting, awarded a \$12.7 million contract to South State, Inc. for the Sea Isle Boulevard Improvement project that will raise the roadway by approximately 4.5-feet and otherwise reconstruct Sea Isle Boulevard.

Traffic has been diverted to the south side of the boulevard; and the contractor has placed fill on the north side of the causeway to an average height of about 6.5-feet, which is 2-feet higher than the eventual height of the completed roadway. The additional 2-feet, which will be removed prior to the next construction phase, is surcharge to compress the underlying layers of soil. The goal is to obtain as much settlement as possible prior to paving on top of the new fill. The current plan is to start paving of the north side this coming fall.

The entrance to the northbound parkway has been reconfigured in order to provide room for eastbound vehicles to travel around vehicles making a left turn onto the parkway entrance.

Motorists are advised to be aware of the revised traffic patterns in the construction zone and the reduced speed limit.

Streetscape Improvement on Landis Avenue

On September 8, 2015, City Council awarded a bid to Think Pavers Hardscaping, of Swedesboro, NJ, in the amount of \$796,648.33 for streetscape improvements on Landis Avenue from 43rd Street to 39th Street. This project includes various aspects of beautification which includes new sidewalks, paver crosswalks, traffic striping, lighting, sod, stone mulching, various tree plantings & tree grates, benches and bike racks. The block from JFK to 40th was previously completed as part of the JFK Gateway Project. Punch list items are being completed, and Landis Avenue is now open to all vehicular traffic.

Public Works Maintenance Garage – 80th Street & Central

On March 23, 2016, City Council awarded a bid to Archetto Construction, of Vineland, NJ, to replace the roof, siding and insulation at this location. Work has begun on this project. Both the east and west side of the building have been completed, with work beginning on the roof at this time. The electric has been fully restored to the building. The maintenance department continues to work out of this location.

Sea Isle Branch – Cape May County Library

The Department of Public Works, in conjunction with the County Library System, Environmental Commission and the Shade Tree Committee, has been working hard to enhance the landscaping at the 4800 Park Road site. This included parking lot and walkway improvements, grading, irrigation, sod, landscaping and trees. Also included were two Terrapin gardens for nesting purposes. Signage is on order to explain their nesting habits including “fun facts.” This portion was in cooperation with Cameron Day, of Sea Isle Boy Scout Troop 76, for his Eagle Project. Public Works employees and Cameron cooperated with the Historical Museum to redo the memorial garden, which includes a new water feature, enhancements to the landscaping and restoration of the mast and statue.

MASTER PLAN RE-EXAMINATION UPDATE:

The Planning Board sub-committee has received and reviewed the initial draft of the Master Plan Re-Examination Report, which was prepared by Maser Consulting; and the document has been forwarded to the full Planning Board.

It is anticipated the full Planning Board will complete their review of the draft during their August 8 meeting. Based on that review, a final review of the draft is expected to occur during a Public Hearing on Monday, September 12, at 7:00 p.m., in City Hall.

SIGN-UP FOR EVENT CANCELLATION ALERTS:

Anyone can sign-up for event cancellation text messages by texting “sicalert” to “84483” on your smart phone. You can also sign-up for event cancellation text messages and email alerts by going to the City’s Visitors Website, www.VISITSICNJ.com, and clicking the “Rained Out” link on the home page. Once signed-up, you will receive alerts whenever a local concert, festival or other outdoor City event has been cancelled, postponed or re-scheduled.

BICYCLE SAFETY OUTREACH EVENT

In conjunction with the New Jersey Division of Highway Traffic Safety, the Sea Isle City Police Department will partner with the NJ State Police on Saturday, August 6, and Saturday, August 13, 3:00 p.m. to 11:00 p.m. each day, to increase awareness of bicycle safety, help prevent accidents, and promote safe riding practices for children and adults alike. During this outreach event, representatives from the State Police and the SICPD will travel around town on bicycles, offering safety info and interacting with bicyclists.

As always, bicyclists are encouraged to practice safe and responsible riding and embolden others around them to do the same by using a helmet, checking equipment, being aware of their surroundings, and obeying all traffic laws.

DON'T DRIVE THROUGH WATER:

The Sea Isle City Police Department reminds motorists of the dangers and hazards associated with driving through flooded streets. City Officials have received numerous complaints regarding vehicles driving through flood water at a high rate of speed, which causes severe wakes that can injure nearby pedestrians, damage fencing and other property, and push water into homes and businesses. Also, drivers often become stranded because vehicles are simply not designed to drive through water. Each year, countless vehicles are damaged or completely destroyed because drivers do not realize that water is often deeper than it appears. Also, drivers mistakenly believe they "can make it through" if they simply drive fast enough. If stranded, emergency personnel may not be able to assist you at peak tides. Accordingly, please be mindful of the adverse effects of driving a vehicle through flood water and refrain from doing so.

TRASH & RECYCLING INFO:

Curbside trash and recycling collections take place twice each week on the following streets:

1st to 44th Street = Wednesday & Saturday
45th to 70th Street = Monday & Thursday
71st to 94th Street = Tuesday & Friday

Don't Forget: The City will not collect carpeting or other construction materials, propane tanks, tires or batteries. Sea Isle City is a Single Stream Recycling Community, which means residents can combine all of their recyclable materials (paper, cans, glass and plastics) in one curbside collection bin. Recycling is not just a good idea...it's the law in Sea Isle City.

Sea Isle City's Trash and Recycling Depot, located next to the Bridge on JFK Boulevard, is open seven days a week (7:15 a.m. - 2:45 p.m.). The Depot will be closed on holidays (except New Year's Day, Presidents Day, Memorial Day, Independence Day and Labor Day). The Depot will accept drop-offs of trash and recycling, however Bulk Trash is not accepted at that location. **Free Refrigerator Magnets** with a complete list of Sea Isle City's year-round trash and recycling information are now available at the Public Works Building, 3905 Central Avenue, and at the Welcome Center, 300 JFK Boulevard. BIKING OR WALKING? IMPORTANT INFO YOU SHOULD KNOW:

Attention Pedestrians:

- By law, pedestrians must cross streets at corners and intersections. Failure to obey pedestrian signals and use crosswalks at signaled intersections comes with a \$54 fine.
- Be on the lookout for vehicles turning right on red – always look left, right, and left again before crossing any street.
- Be visible when walking at night and in inclement weather.
- Only walk sober.
- Eliminate all distractions while walking, such as texting and talking on the phone.

Attention Bicyclists:

- Bicyclists must follow the rules of the road (stop at stop signs, yield to pedestrians in crosswalks, etc.).
- New Jersey law requires anyone under age 17 who rides a bicycle, is a passenger on a bicycle, or is towed as a passenger by a bicycle to wear a safety helmet (N.J.S.A. 39-4-10.1).
- Children should only ride bikes that fit their size – not bikes they will “grow into.”
- No one should ride a bike at night without bicycle lights, N.J.S.A. 39-4-10 (a white light on the front and a red light on the rear of your bike) – and always wear brightly-colored clothing at night (reflective clothes and reflective strips are ideal).
- A bell or other warning device is a legal requirement in New Jersey. It will probably not be heard by motor vehicle drivers, but it is useful as a warning and as a courtesy to alert other bicyclists and pedestrians of your approach (N.J.S.A. 39:4-11).
- Everyone should keep their bikes tuned-up and functioning properly.

DID YOU KNOW?

- **Local TV Channel 97** in Sea Isle City offers community information throughout the year, day and night, on the hour and half-hour.
- **Dogs are not permitted on Sea Isle's Promenade or Beaches** from May 1 to September 30.
- **It is illegal to block the sidewalk with a vehicle** when parking in a private driveway.
- **Sea Isle City offers online view and payment options** for municipal property tax bills and water/sewer utility bills (visit www.seaislecitynj.us and click on the "Tax & Utility Payment Center" icon near the top of the homepage). You can mail-in a payment as always, or pay online through your checking account, credit card or debit card. Please Note: Online viewing is free; however a convenience charge will be applied if you pay your bills online.
- **Sea Isle City Ordinance 18-1.6 requires all trash and recycling be put in proper receptacles when placed on the curb for collection.** Please remember that plastic trash bags are not considered proper receptacles – except to seagulls, which have no problem cutting open plastic bags as they search for a feast and scatter loose trash onto the street. So, please put trash in rigid containers with lids.
- **It's never a good idea to feed Seagulls.** Seagulls can scratch and bite – plus human food is not part of their natural diet. When you feed one seagull, others are sure to quickly show-up and become a nuisance for you and your neighbors.
- **Residents and property owners can register their bicycles with the Sea Isle City Police Department free of charge.** For more info, phone 263-4311.
- **New Jersey State law requires motorists to stop for pedestrians in all crosswalks** – even if a crosswalk does not have painted stripes on the road.
- **Sea Isle City's 2015 Drinking Water Quality Report (aka: Consumer Confidence Report) can be seen on the City's Municipal Website, www.seaislecitynj.us** (under the Public Works link). Paper
